
#### **About Feathers**

# **Entering the Foyer**

The main entrance to the Theatre is via a large foyer.

There is a ramp to the left which leads to a lift, or you can walk up the stairs.

At the top of the stairs, is the Box office.



#### The Box office

It might be busy when you arrive. You may wish to allow some extra time before the show or wear a pair of headphones if it's noisy.

Your parent, guardian or teacher will say hello to Theatre Royal staff.

If you need help at any time, you can ask the people who work at the Box office.

They can help with lots of things, including First Aid or helping you find your parent, guardian or teacher if you get separated or lost.

### **Studio Theatre**

If your show is in the Studio Theatre, you will walk up the stairs to Level 4.

Your parent, guardian or teacher will let you know where to sit.

There are Ushers, who work for the Theatre Royal and are dressed in black clothes. Their job is to help keep you safe and help you find your seat.

It's very important that you listen to any directions they give you.

This lets us know that we need to pay attention and listen in.



You might feel a bit worried or scared by something.


But don't worry - any bits you think are scary don't last very long and it all works out ok.

In Feathers you will hear the narrator voice all the characters, but there is also music and sound effects being used to help create the landscape of rustling bushes, leaves in the wind and splashing water.

There are two composers, Matthew Fargher and Denni Proctor, who have worked together on Feathers to create a soundscape full of original music and sound effects to help tell the story.

The music helps create the mood of each scene with a new character.



## What you will see

The set, costumes and puppets have been designed and made by a huge team of people over many months.

The set has been built in a special way to make it easy for the performers to move things around and create the different places in the story.


There are lots of different puppets, and many of them have special mechanisms inside to help the puppeteers bring them to life.
