In the First World War, Debussy turned to chamber music, seeking clarity and restraint in the French tradition. His *Cello Sonata* (1915) draws on vivid, colourful Baroque models, while the *Violin Sonata* (1917), his final completed work, balances playfulness with poignant intensity.

A decade earlier, Ravel's *String Quartet in F major* (1903–04) revealed his mastery of tradition and innovation. With crystalline textures and rhythmic vitality, it divided critics at first but went on to become one of the century's defining chamber works.

At the turn of the 20th century, French composers sought new colours and textures. Debussy's *Première rhapsodie* (1909–10) glows with atmosphere and virtuosity, while his *Sonata for flute, viola and harp* (1915) revives Baroque elegance with an unusual blend of instruments.

Ravel's *Introduction and Allegro* (1905), a showcase for the harp, sparkles with delicacy and rhythmic drive. His *Violin Sonata No 2* (1923–27) embraces jazz influences, blending French refinement with American rhythms in a strikingly modern, cosmopolitan voice.

Every rose has its thorns.

The Prices are a typical Australian family. Bob and Fran have worked hard to raise their four kids with strong working class ethics even as their circumstances have improved. Honesty, hard work, respect and family values are the lessons handed down in the Price household. With the kids growing up, Bob should have more time to tend to his precious roses, but over the course of a year, a series of family revelations shakes the Price home to its foundations.

Tasmanian Theatre Company and Mudlark Theatre's *Things I Know To Be True* is a tender portrait of the fragility and strength of familial bonds. As Bob's garden changes with the seasons each Price faces personal upheaval. Buried truths emerge and identities are questioned as the family searches for the source of their love for one another.

The script from celebrated playwright Andrew Bovell (*Lantana*) has been given a new local lens by director Ivano Del Pio and an ensemble of Tasmania's finest actors. *Things I Know To Be True* finds a family at an intergenerational intersection where heartbreak and hope collide.

Bizarrerie puts the spotlight on some of the rare and unusual instruments from the Band's collection.

Program highlights include Vivaldi's Concerto for Lute and Viola d'Amore in D minor, showcasing the haunting, bell-like tones of the six-stringed viola d'amore, while Fasch's Concerto for Gallichon gives this almost-forgotten instrument—a gut-strung hybrid that sits somewhere between a lute and a bass guitar—its moment in the spotlight. Also taking centre stage will be a brand-new piccolo violin crafted by Nipaluna luthier Douglas Coghill, along with a cornucopia of extraordinary instruments played by extraordinary musicians.

In the early 20th century, composers reshaped chamber music by blending tradition and innovation.

Prokofiev's Sonata for two violins (1932), written for a Paris festival, astonished with its clarity and restraint. Nadia Boulanger's Two Pieces (1911-14) reveal delicate lyricism, balancing Romantic warmth with French colour. Stravinsky's Suite Italienne (1932), drawn from Pulcinella, looks back to 18th-century themes with modern flair. And in contrast, Moszkowski's Suite for two violins and piano (1903) offers lush Romantic melodies and virtuosity, a final flourish before modernism's arrival.

It's the most important night of the academic year and the private school lads believe they're about to intellectually own their sister school. The topic up for debate: "feminism has failed women."

But as the boys are locked in a class for their one-hour prep time, inflated egos, hormones and nascent masculinity create a pressure cooker environment, leading to a chaotic turn of events.

Played by a female and non-binary cast in drag, this uproarious satire exposes the insecurity, privilege, entitlement and misogyny that runs rife in Australia's private boys schools. With graduates over-represented amongst the nation's powerbrokers and politicians, the award-winning Trophy Boys makes the case for an urgent change to the way in which the Australian education system is serving its young men, women and non-binary students.

The US premiere production of *Trophy Boys*, was directed by Tony Award winner Danya Taymor and opened in June 2025 at the off-Broadway MCC Theatre in New York, where it enjoyed a twice-extended run.

One mother's love, another's loss.

Between them a child grows into manhood but can never return home. *The Other Side of Me* by Gary Lang NT Dance Company, shares the tragedy of Stolen Generations through the true story of an Aboriginal man stranded between two families, continents and cultures – specifically the little-known experience of people adopted into families abroad.

Drawing on a collection of personal letters and poems, Larrakia man Gary Lang, led a cross-cultural collaboration with Northumbria University in the United Kingdom. With care and compassion, this exquisite work of contemporary dance poses questions about the relationship between country of origin, identity, adoption, the criminal justice system and psychological health.

Achingly intimate, the duet confronts the destruction wrought by monarchy and colony, that is still felt by First Nations peoples, but finds redemptive beauty as his spirit is sung home. The work concludes with a 15-minute in-conversation for audiences.

The story is based on real events. However, names, incidents and timelines have been changed for dramatic purposes. All characters depicted in the production are composites or fictitious. Any similarity to the original story, or of fictitious characters to an actual person, living or dead, is coincidental and unintentional.

Ray Lawler's *The Doll Trilogy* is a defining monument of 20th Century Australian theatre. The Melbourne actor and playwright pulls at the threads of the post-war Australian psyche. At a time of profound change, Lawler looked to life's most intimate moments as the place to define the outlines of our culture.

Lawler's works remain enduring for their deep humanity, with his characters personifying the friction that arises in a society transitioning from rural life to urban metropolises. The beginning of a 17-year odyssey.

Set in 1937, *Kid Stakes* is the chronological beginning of Lawler's trilogy, the start of a theatrical odyssey set on Lawler's home turf, in Depression-era Carlton. It's where we first meet Roo, Barney, Olive and Nancy, long before they realise how entwined their lives will become.

Roo and Barney are cane croppers from Queensland who spend their off-season back in Melbourne. They meet Olive and Nancy, two milliners and soon-to-be bartenders, with whom a young romance blossoms and Roo's first gift of a kewpie doll to Olive is made – the start of a 17-year tradition. Meanwhile, a young child next door, Bubba, watches on; as does Olive's wise, cantankerous mum, Emma.


Embodying the boldness and vitality of youth, *Kid Stakes* is a comedy with a big heart, capturing a moment of transition for both the characters and the society in which they live.

World War II is over. Young men are returning home and everything has changed.

It's 1945, Roo and Barney are back in Melbourne, only this time, rather than the heat of cane plantations, it's the fury of the battlefield from which they return.

World War II has shaped Australia's sense of place in the world, forever changing the young men fighting in it and the women working and waiting back home.

When a German-Jewish refugee enters the picture, Australia's ongoing, complicated relationship to migration comes to the fore.

With middle-age upon them, the characters must grapple with adulthood, responsibility and a winter of discontent.

Nancy has married and so Olive decides to introduce Barney to a new date, Pearl, who inadvertently brings his insecurities to the fore. Roo has had a bad season in the cane fields and is forced to take a job in a paint factory. Now 22-years-old, Olive and Nancy's neighbour Bubba is a young woman herself; Olive isn't ready to settle down; and Olive's mum Emma holds the wisdom of seeing generations come of age.

A tension-filled summer is ripe for change. It's a season for reflection, acceptance and letting go.

Summer of the 17th Doll is Ray Lawler's masterpiece, a deeply compassionate work of theatrical realism. Its continued relevance is undeniable, owing to its ability to show a nation in flux at a pivotal time in its history; and the choices all people must eventually confront.



Bub is an 11-year-old with a camera and her family is in crisis. Obsessed with documentary filmmaking, she turns her lens on the breakdown of her parents' relationship, staging dramatised re-enactments to make sense of the chaos.

In each performance of *POV*, two adult actors – who have never seen the script before – join a young performer on stage. As Bub directs them to re-enact scenes from her personal life, the cast navigates tough questions about parenting, mental health and the way we communicate with kids. The story unfolds in real-time as they discover the answers alongside the audience; and Bub gets to the bottom of her mum's erratic behavior. While the two adults fear corrupting the innocence of their child, Bub is determined to learn the truth.

As re:group's next iteration in its series of live cinema experiences, following *Coil* (Mona Foma, 2022), *POV*, is an urgent, live documentary. It blurs the lines between personal history and performance to explore intergenerational connection and the agency of young people.

Mudlark Theatre will cast the state-wide tour of POV with incredible Tasmanian talent.



Bing/Santospirito are Natalya Bing and Joshua Santospirito. *The Equinox Sound Baths* returns to the Theatre Royal for two more sound baths centred on concepts of grief and healing after selling out the performances in 2024. *Equinox* is the product of the pair meeting in 2022, where over a four-week residency they experimented with improvisational musical composition. As the pair coaxed new sonic pathways from their practice, they found their musical conversations returned to concepts of healing, grief and gentleness. The music became a safe space to care for fractured souls.

Over two sessions Bing/Santospirito will weave their healing aural cocoon from synthesisers, piano, cello, percussion and violin – a space for audiences to reflect, restore and relax. Listeners are welcome to sit, stand, move around the space, bring a cushion or a mat on which to sprawl.
